<b>Compulsory</b> REVISION comments	<p><b>Respectful terms for psychiatric patients: Homeless people with psychosis (not vagrant psychosis), behaviour difficult to understand (not bizarre), patients who sign out without medical consent (not absconders)</b></p> <p><b>Correct numerous spelling errors – challenges, fibrosarcoma, consent not sought, and errors within references.</b></p> <p><b>Address limitation of psychiatric diagnoses made on no stated criteria. What is typhoid psychosis – how does it differ from delirium?</b></p> <p><b>Because consent to publish was not obtained from patients, please change all identifying details. How did researchers obtain consent to look at medical records?</b></p> <p><b>As a result of this study, what can the hospital do to reduce delirium mortality? How closely does psychiatric staff and surgical staff work together?</b></p>	
<b>Minor</b> REVISION comments	Reference citations must be consistent	
<b>Optional/General</b> comments	<p>Good descriptive study. Could be made more concise and more explicit directions for change addressed.</p> <p>Might be a good idea to divide into two groups</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. patients with prior psychiatric conditions who come in for surgery – what needs to be done before surgery&gt;</li> <li>b. patients who develop psychiatric problems as a result of surgery – what needs to be done to keep these numbers low.</li> </ol>
